Zoning in on Zoning ~

As we enter into a new year, the Planning and Zoning Office typically sees a slow-down in the number of new permits. We take this time to scan files to keep our electronic database current while we review areas in which changes would increase productivity and efficiency. Part of the changes include: text reviews, map amendments, fee adjustments and suggestions for modifying and simplifying forms for a quicker overall applicant process.

The township currently has two map amendment proposals under review and in the process. The first parcel is Trillium Creek which has both commercial and residential zoning. Located along the Medina City border, the request is to add approximately 2.5

acres of land to the eastern R3 Residential zone. The second request includes 5 parcels of land located on the west side of Wooster Pike from Wedgewood Road to the southern boundary of The Trails at Montville. Preserving the first 1000 feet of Wooster Pike's roadside as commercial, the remaining rear portions are proposed to become an R2 Residential zone. These requests for map changes have been presented by the landowners who feel that their land is not zoned to best suit the township's comprehensive plan nor the property owner.

The construction process for the new GetGo Gas Station, Chipotle Restaurant, and Starbuck's Café is coming along nicely. The anticipated opening is for late winter/early spring of 2018. The township will be repairing the two western lanes of Normandy Park Drive to tie into the eastern new lanes recently installed. This process will take place in 2018.

The 2017 permit totals through the end of December were 506 of which 99 were new homes and cluster units. Montville continues to lead the county in new home builds. With the Zoning Commission overseeing the growth, Montville Township continues to maintain a good balance and high occupancy rate without empty structures.

We wish all of our residents, business owners and community partners a very Happy New Year.

At your Service ~

As part of an exciting collaboration with PeaceWorks, our service department has spent a great deal of 2017 constructing a lodge-type building shell at Austin Badger Park along River Styx Road. This building is currently being completed by an interior crew from PeaceWorks. PeaceWorks is a subsidiary organization of the Intervention for Peace, an organization that provides services and jobs for people with developmental disabilities. This lodge will be called Spokes Two and will house a café, restrooms, meeting room and mountain bike/snowshoe rental business.

We also spent a great deal of time and effort making repairs and improvements to the new Austin Badger Park. This park has experienced many visitors who enjoy the mountain bike trail, walking pathways and fitness equipment.

Currently in the planning stage is a state project to widen and improve Route 18 from Normandy Park Drive past Buehlers. This project will include traffic control devices, access roads to businesses, an additional traffic light and a walking/bike pathway coming from the City through Montville on the south side. Expected to increase flow and reduce accidents, the project also affords us the opportunity to develop a "sense of arrival" to our township. How that will appear is a topic of ongoing discussions and ideas at present.

At the same time, we have completed the first phase of the Normandy Park Drive widening project. Here, an extra turning lane was constructed to accommodate the projected increase in traffic for the new businesses being built to the east of that road. Soon to open will be a Get-Go Gas Station/Convenience Store, a Starbucks and a Chipotle restaurant. The second phase of this road improvement will take place this coming summer when we plan to resurface the southbound lane. We want to thank the residents and businesses in Normandy Park for their patience during this period of construction. Nexus Pipeline Project

The proposed NEXUS Gas Transmission pipeline project is approximately 255 miles of new "greenfield" natural gas pipeline located in Ohio and Michigan. It will have the capacity to move 1.5 billion cubic feet of gas per day. The project partners are DRE Energy and Spectra Energy.

If not delayed by the City of Green lawsuit, construction is scheduled to be done by the third quarter of 2018. The timeline for construction of each segment of the pipeline will vary but typically the work will be conducted in short segments, taking approximately 4 to 8 weeks to complete. This duration will vary based upon features that are being crossed at each location. There will be some areas where construction will take longer based upon construction techniques and existing conditions.

The pipeline will be constructed using high-strength carbon steel, manufactured in accordance with U.S. Department of Transportation pipeline regulations. Approximately 94% of the pipe being used for the project was manufactured in the United States.

To ensure that the pipeline remains in safe and reliable operating condition, NEXUS will employ a number of redundant, overlapping layers of protection during the construction process and throughout the life of the project. NEXUS construction and environmental inspectors, as well as FERC third-party compliance monitors, will oversee the day-to-day construction activities. There will also be FERC inspectors and state environmental inspectors that will periodically be on site to inspect the work and review construction records.

As various long sections are completed and backfilled, the pipes are filled with water and pressurized to a point higher than the maximum pressure at which the pipe will be operated. This test pressure is held for a minimum of eight continuous hours and catalogued to ensure the integrity of the pipeline.

Following pipeline installation, all disturbed areas will be returned as close as possible to their preconstruction contours. The entire right-of-way and work area will be restored in accordance with applicable federal and state requirements, as well as individual landowner agreements. The temporary construction workspace will also be returned to its original state. All temporary fencing and gates required during construction will be removed. NEXUS Right-Of-Way Agents will be available throughout the restoration process to help respond to landowner questions and concerns.
