1819 – 2019 Montville Township Celebrates its Bicentennial

Happy New Year to you and Happy 200th Birthday to Montville Township! Founded in 1819, Montville was named after a town in Vermont with high rolling land where General Aristarchus Champion, the original proprietor lived.

Montville Township was formally organized in 1819 and the first township trustees elected were T.M. Currier, Aaron Smith and Austin Badger. These names should sound familiar as they were the names chosen for Montville Township's three new parks developed from the 252 acre Blue Heron golf course that went out of business in 2011.

One of the projects being orchestrated by Trustee Bischof and Ellen Shimko, a local volunteer, to commemorate our bicentennial is tape recorded vignettes of interviews with 13 of our oldest residents to document their earliest memories and stories told to them by their ancestors about the early days of our township. We hope to place these interviews on our website where you can also read more of the history of the township. Plans are also underway to recruit students from Highland and Medina High School to participate in a drawing contest of a banner type memorial for the event. The winner would have his banner placed on Montville Townships road signs, our letterhead and our webpage.



Staring out the New Year 2019 is a new single family residential subdivision with approximately 269 new homes. Developed by Pulte Homes, this project will be before the Zoning Commission and the Board of Zoning Appeals between the months of January - March for plan approvals with anticipation of starting the project by summer 2019.

With the addition of these new homes, there has been interest in the commercial properties aligning Wooster Pike that offer commercial growth possibilities. Along with these inquiries, there is also interest in the Medina Road (SR18) corridor near the I71 intersection. The developers on both the east and west sides of I71 have potential business plans that will be presented to the township upon solidifying contracts.

Montville has grown rapidly during the past 15 years and is now seeing a steady growth with a good blend of residential and commercial uses. The key to establishing and maintaining a balanced growth is to evaluate and monitor township resources and services without adversely affecting the residents and business owners.

This is a great time to talk about the Service Department and our busy year. During 2018, we have completed many projects with the opening of the lodge at Austin Badger Park to the partial path being completed at Cobblestone Park funded by a community block grant.

The Normandy Park Drive reconstruction project was completed this fall with the south-bound lanes finished. We started some road repaving projects like Smith Road, Guilford Road and Autumn Run Drive. Throughout the year we are still making repairs and im-

provements to other roads for the upcoming pavement plan for 2019. We are also planning improvements to ditches and drainage, cross culverts and trimming back trees for line of sight and road surface conditioning.

And don't forget that snow will be here soon. As I write this article, I look out on a sunny day in the 40's. It's hard to talk about snow but we will definitely see it during 2019. We seem to be good on the amount of salt that is on hand and our trucks have all been through the shop and are ready to go. I would like to remind everyone to check their mail boxes to make sure they are in good structural condition and that they are far enough off the road edge. Keep obstructions out of the roadway like trashcans, and snow from driveways to help our plow crew keep the roads clear and safe.

Haberfield wins Point of Light Award

Renee Haberfield, a volunteer with the Medina County Police Activities League (MCPAL), recently received the Daily Point of Light Award.

The award celebrates the power of individuals to spark change and improve the world. It is an award started by the late George H.W. Bush.

Haberfield has managed MCPAL's food pantry for the last three years. She unpacks pallets filled with at least 5,000 pounds of donated food twice a week. It's donated by those in the community and the Akron-Canton Regional Food Bank.

This food serves 21 MCPAL families a week, each who receive enough items necessary to make 2-3 meals per week. Along with other volunteers, she delivers the food to a pick-up area or directly to the families in need.

"I think it's just something you naturally do" she said in a statement. "My parents were amazing teachers and they taught us lessons in life. They taught us to see need, and when there is need, that God has given us natural gifts and talents and abilities to meet those needs."

She said it's rewarding that even the little things they do are making a difference in people's lives.

Renee has been a Montville Cares Volunteer since the committee was formed in 2013. Her creativity is seen every October on our scary walk pathway.
