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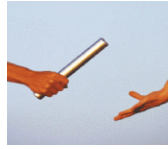

Montville Township Police Department Changing Leaders



On January 4th, 2021, Chief Terry Grice will begin his service as Medina County Sheriff, and Lt. Matt Neil will take the reign as Montville Township's new Chief of Police. Chief Grice has worked for Montville Township for 21 years and has spearheaded many community service projects, including the Take Control Teen Driving Diversion Program and the Medina County Police Activity League (MCPAL). Montville Township will miss Chief Grice and we wish him well in his new role.

Lt. Neil, (soon to be Chief Neil), a native of Wadsworth, joined the Wadsworth Police Department in 1993 as a dispatcher right out of high school. He spent more than a decade there before briefly working for the Medina Township Police, and was ultimately hired by Montville Township in 2003. His many duties include handling all of the township's technology. This transition has been ongoing since June and included the promotion of Sgt. Chris LaFond to Lieutenant and Officer Cory Searle to Sergeant.

Officers Receive Medina County Safe Communities Award



Officer Cory Searle was presented with a Medina County Safe Communities Award by Sergeant Brett Harrison for issuing the most OVI's in the department in the last year. Officer Searle was born and raised in Montville Township and joined the department in June of 2014, after graduating as class president of the Cleveland Heights Police Academy.



Officer Zach Denton was presented with a Medina County Safe Communities Award for the most criminal arrests resulting from traffic stops in the last year. Most of these arrests were drug related. Officer Denton joined the Montville Township Police Department as an auxiliary police officer in May of 2013 and was hired as a fulltime officer in January of 2016. Officer Denton has dedicated his adult life to public safety and still serves his hometown community as a part-time fire fighter/EMT with the City of Wadsworth Fire Department.

Here's How

During election season, campaign signs dot yards and roadsides across the country. But what happens to all these signs after the elections are over? What is the best way to dispose of them?

NO X Do not put campaign signs in your curbside recycling container or a drop-off recycling container!

Campaign signs are a recycling challenge because they're made from multiple materials, such as paper, plastic and metal. Disposing of them requires taking them apart and disposing of each portion based on its material.

You can do this here:

Before tossing your campaign sign, consider saving it for future use. You could attach a new message to the board and use it to promote a special event. A local school or nonprofit organization may be able to use the sign, too. If you don't want to save the entire sign, you may be able to reuse the wire stand for future signs.

Tips for Salting Sensibly

Medina County Soil & Water Conservation District

Road salt only works ABOVE 15 degrees F.

One teaspoon of salt permanently pollutes 5 gallons of water!

Apply BEFORE snow falls or right AFTER snow is removed from the pavement.

NEVER apply salt when rain is in the forecast. It washes into waterways as a pollutant.

Sweep up excess salt from dry pavement when it is no longer useful.

Our overuse of salt to clear pavement contributes to polluting our streams. Salt is harmful to roadside vegetation and aquatic life. These same streams flow into Lake Erie from the northern part of Medina County and into the Ohio River from the southern part, carrying the salt. Many of us get our drinking water from Lake Erie! Please use salt sparingly and sensibly or find a safer alternative.
